reinforcements from Perth, combined with powerful machinery, all performed like clockwork to work together so effectively.


Someone timed the work rate at just 8-9 minutes between panels at one stage

Demolition

A contract is being drawn up with Gerard Antoine to effect the demolition of the present Bridgegeley building. The demolition is expected to commence on the 13th November 2006.

Gerard has generously offered to demolish the building in return for the materials from the house, and a modest fee well below commercial rates, which will cover his costs. This process will take 3-4 weeks. We appreciate Gerard's generous donation of his time.

Renovation

Shirley Smyth recently purchased the property next door to Bridgegeley, at 95 Wellington Street, from Jason Hemsley, to redevelop as a commercial office building. This is currently being renovated, and will be made available for use by the Church as a temporary office until Bridgegeley Community Centre is completed in mid 2007.

It is intended that the grassed area at the back of this property will be available for ongoing use for recreational activities connected with the Centre. It is hoped that at least one room will be ready for occupation by the middle of November, in time for the changeover.
